• Education is a critical part of the VWC Experience. More skills on the part of more members yield a safer environment, less mechanical damage and better and better projects for individual Woodworkers. Overall a better experience for everyone.

- In anticipation of an influx of new members, additional help is needed to assist with classes including Certification. Many new members have little or no woodworking experience, but they want to learn. (They see how much for you're having!) Talk to john Herega or Dick Besler to help out with Certification, the first step for all new members. Talk to Debbie Larouere or Bob Matthews about other skill or project topics. Current Instructors are looking to be sure they have a back-up to cover classes if they have to step away for a bit. Talk to them to offer your help.
- Also looking for "Make it and Take it" workshop ideas and Instructors for shorter, skill builder project classes
 that will be easy, fun and build confidence and safety as well. Especially looking for Instructors for classes in
 Jewelry Making, Box construction and Picture-Framing and Wood Piercing and Embellishing.
- So maybe you don't quite have the skills to Instruct; but how about helping out? Don't have the time or empty calendar to take on a set schedule? We're flexible. How about being part of a team or extra eyes for safety, or helping out on a rotating or occasional basis? We need your help and you'll have some fun and meet new people.
- The Carvers are working on new opportunities for members to give carving a try without investing in any equipment. Current efforts revolve around daily support of existing IT systems such as the Front Desk and Electronic Doors. New PC for Front Desk arrived and has been installed. Development efforts continue to take place for the systems we will need when we have a second wood shop location. A new electronic door system has been developed, expect it to be a more reliable platform than current Windows based product. Planning to install and test live in June/July timeframe. Discussions are ongoing with The Villages about how we may use Maxgalaxy or provide them data needed to better understand woodshop utilization.

The VWC Toy Department is on target for another successful year.

We participated in Toys on the Square on Tuesday May 21st at Spanish Springs. Despite having Scooter the DJ for the evening's entertainment, it was the hot weather that cause the low attendance and a meager financial performance. We had toy sales of \$201.00 and only collected \$14.00 in donations for a total of \$215.00. This was our last show before the summer break. We will restart the program again at Brownwood Paddock Square on Thursday September 19th.

The Elves and Painters continue their hard work!

They have produced 4881 toys through the end of May, which puts us 814 toys off last year's record pace.

On the shipping side we are still making good progress.

- Through the end of May we have shipped 3361 toys with a donation value of \$20,474.

The Toy Department continues to work closely with the Woodworking Technology Department on education, training and certification on both the CNC and Laser Engraver. Dennis Drazhowski, our primary Laser operator has departed for the cooler weather of the north and now Marty Drucker and Ron Lessard have stepped into the puzzle production role after recently completing training. We continue to improve and refine our puzzle process as we gather more experience on the laser. Jo Harlos, our Painting manager has added five new members to her crew to replace some of her seasonal workers who have also departed.

Woodworking Technology

The Woodworking Technology Department has wound up current training classes for this "school year". As mentioned before, we will be organizing a "suite" of classes starting in the fall. Members will sign up for three days of classes held in about a week period of time. At the end of this training, students can start a process of learning to operate the CNC leading to certification. Watch for the fall education catalog, and a yet to be announced technology fair to learn more about this training program. The technology fair will be a day long activity where members can watch and ask questions about the software we use for the CNC, and watching the CNC in operation. Dates and more details will follow.

We have certified a total of seventeen members to date. Five, for appropriate reasons, have been waived as published operators. This leaves twelve that all members can contact to see if they will help them with CNC projects. A list of these operators is updated and posted on the wall behind the CNC. It is preferred members will have designed their project or have asked a trained member to do the design so the operator needs only review the design details and run the project. Any member that has completed the previously titled E501 and E502 should have knowledge to do basic design work. A list of these members will be made available soon.

The Laser training continues at a healthy pace. Approximately sixty members have purchased our deeply discounted copies of 2018 Corel Draw. A personalize certification process for those wanting to run the laser will be formalized by fall.

Recently had the opportunity to visit with Bob Matthews and Debbie Larouere who head up the VWC Education Department. They provided this 5-year club member with a comprehensive history of the development of the education initiative for our club. Kudos for great work done to date.

As you might imagine, that conversation led to discussing the new shop location and the attendant significant increase in members. The 'new shop' benefit doesn't come without its challenges in many areas and education is certainly one of them. So let me digress a bit to lay some groundwork. Imagine a small but growing town with a single movie theater. Over time, the demand for movie attendance has increased to the point that a new, additional theater is built. Now you can rightfully imagine that from opening day on, the town's people would expect something like a doubling of theater seats for the community. So too might Villagers think of the VWC with a new shop. But that will not be the case due to our need to certify new members. Hold that certification thought for a moment and imagine that we can safely and intelligently approve a significant number of new Club members in short order. And now consider the increased demand for shop offered education classes! I am not equating certification and discretionary education beyond the recognition that both require participation of qualified leaders and assistants.

Bob and Debbie observed that in the early years, a number of well qualified woodworkers joined the club and offered their knowledge in teaching and leadership roles. Over the more recent years, fewer new members seem to have that background. And perhaps some that do are more reserved about offering the benefit of their skills. Thus, each of us is encouraged to consider if we might step up to this need. Please consider if you might have the capability to lead a team for certification or a class; maybe you've been in an assistant role and could now take the helm; or maybe you've been in the wings with no role but are capable of back-filling an assistant's role.

I assure you, the Education Department leadership, like the other departments I've surveyed, is well on top of their game. They have solid plans for the future of the club and a significant core team of accomplished men and women. Still, like all good programs, new resources are appropriate. I encourage you to step up to contribute to maintaining this club's record of excellence.


