

Toys

The Toy Department continues to work hard to achieve our 2018 Goals.

My thanks to all the members of the Toy Team, both elves and painters who continue to make this program a success!

We have participated in no external community activity since May, but that doesn't mean that we haven't been busy! Since our last report for the end of June, Toy production activities have continued at a steady pace.

- We produced 898 toys in the month of July
- We produced 409 toys in the month of August
- We have now produced 6060 toys in 2018 through the end of August. This puts us 1109 toys ahead of where we were at that time last year.
- We have also produced an additional 170 Toys through the 5th of September.

On the shipment side of the ledger we have doubled the shipment volume since our last report at the end of June.

- We shipped 1226 toys in the month of July
- We shipped 593 toys in the month of August
- We have now shipped 3524 toys to clients in 2018, with a donation value of \$27,191.00

The Toy Team has also had the opportunity to get trained on and participate in production using some of the shop's newly acquired technology.

Our Harry McIntyre has been among the first to complete training and successfully run several different projects on the CNC machine. Working with Lowell Sundermann and Jerry Leinsing, Harry was able successfully convert our method of making our Alligator pull toy with it's critical placement of three axles and two rotating balls into a highly repeatable result that significantly reduced our rework. They then took what they learned there and applied it to our turtle pull toy. Further, we standardized the blanks used to produce the two toys so that we can make either toy from a single blank design. Since then Harry and Lowell have also added three puzzles that have significant numbers of hole to the program. Great work!!

The shop has also acquired the Epilog Laser Engraver that has been used to produce the Toy Department's puzzles and other toy components over the past three years. Once Lowell and Jerry have had an opportunity to put together a training program, the intention is to make the Laser available to members who will have the opportunity to design and execute their own projects using the machines' amazing capabilities.

Recently I received a call from the Villages Entertainment Department saying that they are making changes to their Market Nights at the Town Squares starting October 1st 2018!

The good news is that since we already have confirmed dates through the end of the year we still have those dates in place. However, where we are going to be located has changed!

The Villages is instituting Market Nights at Brownwood Paddock Square on Thursday nights. Further, they are rescheduling Market Night at Lake Sumter Landing to Wednesday night and will no longer have Monday Market Nights at Spanish Springs. After October 1st 2018 there will be one market night per square per week.

So.....here's what it means to our Toys on the Square for the balance of 2018.

- -Thursday September 13th is still at Lake Sumter Landing
- -Thursday October 11th is now at Brownwood Paddock Square
- -Thursday November 8th is now at Brownwood Paddock Square
- -Wednesday November 21st is now at Lake Sumter Landing
- -Thursday December 13th is now at Brownwood Paddock Square

We will continue to start setup at 4pm and need to have our booth set up by 4:45pm. We will start to tear down at 8:30 and need to be off the square prior to 9:00 pm.

I am have now gotten maps of our booth location for each square and shared them with the Toy Team.

I will also be talking to the Entertainment Department in early October to work on our 2019 calendar.

WHATS NEW?

16" Compass located in the tool crib – layout tools drawer.







The strong bar system is a series of 3" sections, or extensions, when needed for pepper mills or starter bores for deep hollowing for hollow form vessels.

It is constructed of thick $\frac{3}{4}$ " diameter steel and mounts directly into the tail stock which means there is no need for a Jacobs chuck. It can be used with any $\frac{3}{8}$ " shank Forstner bit or any other type of drilling tool with a standard $\frac{3}{8}$ " shank. It is modular and can extended ($\frac{5}{8}$, $\frac{8}{8}$ 11") simply by adding extensions to the standard assembly



1. Thread extension section into taper adaptor and secure in place by tightening together using a 5/8" wrench and tightening the set screws. **NOTE**; When disassembling make sure to loosen set screws before un-threading sections.



- 2. Thread Forstner Bit holder extension and secure in place by tightening together using a 5/8" wrench and tightening the set screws. **NOTE**; When disassembling make sure to loosen set screws before unthreading sections.
- 3. Insert desired bit into the
- 4. Forstner bit holder and secure in place by tightening both set screws in Forstner bit holder.



5. Insert assembly into tailstock of lathe and firmly seat assembly into tail stock. **WARNING:** Failure to seat assembly into taper firmly may cause the assembly to rotate when boring.

When disassembling be careful not to lose any of the set screws, return to the tool crib.

TABLE SAW SAFETY (Continued Part IV)

HOW TO MINIMIZE OR PREVENT INJURY FROM KICKBACKS (continued)

- > Use a push stick or push block when ripping short, narrow (6" width or less), or thin material.
- > Use push block or miter gauge hold down when dadoing or molding.



- For increased safety in crosscutting, use an auxiliary wood facing attached to the miter gauge using the holes provided in the gauge
- Never use the fence as a length stop when crosscutting.
- > Do not hold or touch the free end or cut off section of a workpiece when crosscutting. On throughsawing operations the cut off section MUST NOT be confined.
- Always keep your hands out of the line of the saw blade and never reach back of the cutting blade with either hand to hold the workpiece.

Bevel ripping cuts should be made with the fence on the right side of the blade on the on left tilting blades and the left side on the right tilting saw so that the blade tilts away from the fence and minimizes the possibility of the work binding, resulting in kickback.

Woodworking Technology

Both Jerry Leinsing and Lowell Sundermann are very honored to be asked to co-manage the newly formed VWC department: **Woodworking Technology**. As of now, this department will be involved in the management and roll out of CNC Routing and Milling and Laser Engraving and Cutting technology.

The CNC machine requires around 20 hours of classroom and hands on training to operate the machine safely. As part of the Woodworking Technology effort, Jerry and Lowell co-produced three 12 hour classroom training courses. Attendees were selected from the more experienced woodworkers in the shop this summer. Fifteen individuals attended the classes and approximately ten have achieved certification. They will be available to run projects of members who provide properly prepared designs in the design software, VCarve Pro. Training to use VCarve Pro starts now. We are offering E501 6 hours of Introduction to VCarve Pro, and E502, Advanced Design using VCarve Pro. See the Education publications.

We are in the beginning stages of bringing an **Epilog Laser Engraver/Cutter** on line. We will be interfacing to the Laser via Corel Draw. Members can provide designs generated in Corel Draw, or any program that Corel Draw will import. That means if you are already designing in another software package, it may be highly likely that we can bring your

design into the Master CorelDraw package and then send it to the Laser. VWC has obtained an agreement with Corel Draw to own 50 licensed copies of Corel Draw under their Education Program. Normally a package retails for \$499. The cost of the licensed copy is \$50 which includes taxes.

We will be testing the Epilog Laser and software capabilities for the next 30 days. You are invited to stop by and see what is developing. See Lowell or Jerry for more details.
