In addition to monthly (or more often) updates of the computer operating systems, the team regularly troubleshoots computer and network issues and continues to update and develop Front Desk applications.

Bill Hecht, and Dick Hartley continue working on improving and updating the member photographs.

A new Windows 11 computer was purchased to support Merchandise and was installed at RA.

Further work at RA included replacing an old network switch and most notably the installation of a mesh wifi network at Rolling Acres. This modification improved wireless access about 400% over the older wifi.

At the request of Brain Landis, I have assumed the role of IT manager and continue to work with the team to improve and upgrade the network at both Rolling Acres and Brownwood. Our next goal is to further enhance network security at both locations

Great news from the lumber department. We have seen a significant reduction in cost on a number of the most common wood species. The price of some lumber has been reduced 40 to 50% per board foot in the last few months. For example the cost of Poplar is \$3.16, Cherry \$3.36, Hard Maple \$3.44, and Soft Maple \$3.40.

In your wildest dreams, did you ever think that the price of prime Cherry lumber would be only 20 cents higher per board foot than Poplar?

Thanks to Tony Torra's efforts, we will also be receiving several hundred board feet of natural edge cypress slab cuts in the near future at a very, very reasonable price.

Stop by the lumber department at either the Rolling Acres or Brownwood locations to take advantage of these prices for your next project.

The Elves and Painters continue to work hard at satisfying our client needs for this year.

On the production side we have made 6,337 toys through the end of August. So far in September we have added another 520 toys, despite a number of equipment issues including the loss of our main compressor at RA.

Woodworking Technology has resolved the issues with the RA Epilog Laser and the CNC.

On the shipping side we have made shipments totaling 4,679 toys with a donation value of \$ 31,851 at the end of August. We have already made four additional shipments in September containing 515 toys with a donation value of \$5,902. We are working on another four shipments for this month.

Our Toys on the Square Project is back from our summer shutdown (June, July and August). Our first outing of the fall season was on Thursday September 7th. Our schedule for the balance year is:

The turners group will meet on **Tuesday October 17 at 7:00 P**M sharp in the Brownwood meeting room.


The turners group is in need of help to resume live demonstrations as well as live streaming demonstrations, physical set up as well as computer/IT help.

We have a full inventory at all of the sites (usually 10 urns) as of this writing. We have also supplied the MIA (Missing in America) Project with 50 urns for

their needs. The MIA Project searches for completely forgotten cremains and have located over 5000 vets that "fell thru the cracks" nationwide.



WE'RE GETTING OLDER OR AT LEAST SOME OF THE EQUIPMENT IS

As many of you already know the RA compressor has been down for a couple of weeks. It's the second large compressor the shop has had since RA opened many years ago. A replacement compressor and air dryer has been approved by the Board of Directors (BOD). Air compressors are the 'life blood' of the dust collection systems in both shops and given the wear and tear they receive it's hard to believe they last as long as they do. Until the new compressor installation is completed RA classes requiring dust collection will use and be connected to one of the roll-around vacuum cleaners.

BROWNWOOD PLANER UNDERGOES MAJOR SURGERY

If you've been at Brownwood lately you may have seen the planer either shut down or torn apart. It's been challenging to say the least trying to calibrate the machine and diagnose why it goes out of calibration after its been supposedly calibrated. More recently, parts have been removed and new parts were bought and installed.



It all started several weeks ago when a

thick piece of wood was either misread or inadvertently fed into the planer jamming the machine and causing the left side feed pressure spring to lock up fully compressed. It took a pry bar to gently loosen the spring tension. Since that time, hours have been spent in coordination with Grizzly trying to figure out why it won't stay in calibration.

Inspection of the gears that raise and lower the bed also reviled wear which may have been caused by the jamb or plain wear and tear the machine receives during hundreds if not thousands of thickness adjustments made over weeks and months. To minimize future problems the BOD approved the purchase of an additional 15 inch planer. It will not have the up and down drive motor to adjust the bed for different thicknesses. The machine will have manual adjustment capabilities. Once the new planer is put in operation the old one will be used for large projects such planing large slabs or many board feet of wood to build tables, cabinets or prepare blanks for turning classes.

IN WITH THE NEW OUT WITH THE OLD

As mentioned earlier the BOD has approved several new pieces of equipment in addition to other equipment that did not require Board approval. So far this year your club dues have been used to purchase the following:

- Air and dust collection compressor and dryer
- Two Jessem router tables with digital readout speed adjustable routers

- Wood leveling jig
- Reusable epoxy molds
- Lathe hollowing jig
- Leveling/flattening jig and router
- Flat Master Surface Sander

Brownwood

- Grizzly oscillating spindle sander
- Flat Master Surface Sander
- Leveling/flattening jig and router
- Reusable epoxy molds

STORING PROJECTS IN THE ASSEMBLY ROOMS

Members are reminded projects that are being <u>actively worked on</u> can be temporarily stored in the assembly room. The operative words are actively worked on. It doesn't mean working on it once a week or every other week. If the project is large such as a hutch or large cabinet, something members have to work around or it will require an entire assembly table for



a period of time, authorization is required. Again, it also needs to be actively worked on.

Maintenance routinely inspects the project work slips that are required on projects. If it's filled out incorrectly, completion date past due etc., it will be marked in red. If the slop is not updated, does not mean the dates are merely changed, it will be pulled, held for a reasonable period and sold or put it the scrap box.

Storing wood a member plans, hopes or knows they will use it sometime in the future is not permitted. Buying wood because the price is right or it's a good deal and storing it on the shelving in the assembly room is also not authorized.

Most members follow the rules but others who store scraps, cutoffs or tote bags of scrap materials are using space that other members could use. The picture shows nine incorrectly marked project storage slips that were pulled by maintenance. Some were claimed but others were never asked for and ended up in the scrap box or free pile.

Our returning Northern members will soon be with us so now is the perfect time take scraps and small projects home, check to see if project storage slips are completely filled out and keep the assembly areas looking neat and organized.

YOU CAN'T HAVE OR USE ENOUGH CLAMPS

Sure, more clamps are better but what about thinking of ways to minimize the number of clamps? Using wood cauls across or down a project applies the same pressure and uses fewer clamps.

In early August we created and published a video explaining our decision to require members interested in laser technology to start by learning to use our Glowforge Pro laser machine.

We believe this to be in the best interest of the majority of our members. Instead of the cost and training required to run the Epilog Lasers, the Glowforge offers the capability for engraving and cutting names, logos, and images on personal projects and family gifts.

Glowforge offers a 30 day free trial of their Premium software giving new users a chance to understand the value of paying a monthly (or yearly) subscription for expanded design tools, free projects, and faster processing time. At the end of the 30 day trial, we believe new operators will be able to decide if they are satisfied with limiting their use to the Glowforge, if they want to subscribe to Premium status, pursue using Inkscape for designing and image editing, and/or pursue using CorelDraw and certification to use the Epilog lasers.

Additional advance classes are being made available as well. To start this entire process I recommend you sign up for E611 Glowforge Introduction and go where you interests lead you.

President's September 2023 Report

To All Members:

As I am sure you all are aware that last month, September, brought us mechanical problems at both shops. RA was hit the hardest with the air compressor failing. The air compressor is needed to clean the dust collector system so as a result we curtailed 95% of the operations that produce sawdust. From placing the order for a new unit, getting it shipped to us then installed, it took almost 2 weeks. Now we are up and running with a brand-new compressor and air dryer. However, the RA planer motor failed right when we got the air compressor back into operation. The motor was brand new last January so is covered by warranty but required shipping

back to the manufacturer for repairs. The spare planer we have is up and running just fine so all is well.

At our Brownwood location the large planer there has been having some issues and we tore it down to replace several parts. In the meantime, the backup planer there was put into use. The backup planer makes a lot of noise so we ran it outdoors and decided that we should get a better, quieter and more reliable planer and set it up so that most of the planning can be done on that unit and larger jobs can go to the large original planer when needed. All seems to be well at BW.

I guess we can say when it rains it pours. But at least this occurred in the slow season. Also, a big thanks goes to our maintenance people for the time and work they put in to get these situations fixed.

In other news the holiday season is approaching, and we are asking for donation projects for Festival of Trees, which supports the Sumter County Special Olympics, and our Club's Holiday Party raffle and auction. Donations can be left at both shops.

I thank all of our members for their donations and time they put in to make our Club a success.
